

If your family is currently homeless or facing imminent homelessness, the Memphis & Shelby County Emergency Housing Partnership can help you find immediate assistance, as well as connect vou with an EarnBenefits Counselor that will help pursue benefits for which you may be eligible. Only those with children who are either currently homeless or facing immediate and imminent homelessness qualify for the program. Qualifying callers will be assessed for eligibility for the Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Rehousing Program, or referred to Metropolitan Inter-Faith Association's (MIFA) Emergency Services Program. Those who do not qualify will be referred to programs more adequately suited to their situation.

Dial 211 for Help!

If you are looking for help or want to privide someone with help, just dial 211 to reach the community information and referral resources of LINC, the Library Information Center at the Memphis Public Library. LINC, in conjunction with United Way of the Mid-South, maintains a large, comprehensive database of human services organizations, government agencies, and volunteer groups. They offer free and immediate information for help when:

- You are homeless and do not qualify for rapid rehousing programs
- You need affordable, reliable childcare
- You need help with clothing or meals
- You have questions about your eligibility for food stamps or other state and federal benefits
- You need information about available transportation for the disabled
- You are seeking help with substance abuse or mental health problems
- You are a runaway teen who is seeking help



We hope it will connect others at risk to people who wish to give food to the hungry, drink to the thirsty, clothes to the naked, and shelter to the homeless.



Memphis Union Mission: Men's Emergency Shelter, 383 Poplar Ave. (picture pg.8)







A Letter From MSPJC / 1

Mid South Peace and Justice Center

We are a multi-issue, cross-constituency, and membership-based organization working to fulfill our mission to **engage, organize,** and **mobilize** communities to realize social justice through nonviolent action.

The homeless community has faced many injustices, and we are dedicated to improving services and empowering the homeless. Instead of taking a top-down approach to confronting homelessness, we want to see that their voices are added to the conversation and ensure they have a seat at the table. Collaboration between service organizations and people who are homeless will allow us to have a better understanding of the problem, leading us to a better solution.

Our current efforts to improving the living conditions of Memphis's homeless include facilitation of **Homeless Organizing for Power and Equality** (below) and the **Memphis Bus Rider's Union** (pg. 30.)

Homelessness is nothing less than a human rights issue. In addressing this challenge, we intend to do everything we can to ensure a higher quality of life for all Memphians.

A Place of Hospitality for Homeless and Poor Persons 1268 Jefferson, Memphis, TN 38104 Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, 8AM-11:30AM

In the spirit of hospitality in each of the world's great religions, Manna House provides a place of welcome where persons are treated with respect and dignity.

Each day that we are open we offer coffee, water, use of a restroom, a place to relax, read or play board games. On Mondays and Thursdays there are showers for men (limited to 20, with signup the previous day that Manna House is open), and on Tuesdays there are showers for women (limited to 15, with signup on Monday).

Also on Mondays and Thursdays "Socks and Hygiene" are offered to 51 persons. On Tuesdays "Socks and Soap" are offered to 51 persons. There is no requirements for ID or social security number to access any of the services. To ensure that a person gets on the "Socks and Hygiene List" it is necessary to arrive before 8:30am. The list fills up fast, especially toward the end of the month. We begin to sign persons up for both "Socks and Hygiene" and the shower list at 7:45am. Manna House does not have a phone.

Manna House is funded completely by donations and neither seeks nor accepts any government funding. There is no paid staff at Manna House; all are volunteers.

Free Monthly Legal Clinic

Felony disenfranchisement is a serious issue with far reaching consequences for our communities. This is why Mid-South Peace & Justice Center partnered with Memphis Area Legal Services, the Memphis Bar Association, and the Shelby County Public Defender's Office to help felons restore their rights.

A free legal clinic occurs the second Saturday of every month from 10AM-12PM. Those with a legal question can talk face to face with an attorney in order to get quick advice. You should get there 20-30 min early, and bring any documents you have pertaining to your legal situation. The location of the clinic is:

Community Alliance For The Homeless (CAFTH)

Provides housing opportunities in the Memphis area. Eligibility for this housing is based on a two-step process: An initial screening, known as the Vulnerability Index (VI) A second assessment, known as the VAT, for those found vulnerable through the VI.

Both parts of this assessment can be completed at the Hospitality Hub (pg. 3, map 35) on Tuesdays between 9:30AM-11:30AM. Status can be checked at the Hub.

Getting Identification (ID)

You can get help obtaining an ID by going to the the Hospitality Hub (above, map 35) to fill out paperwork. First Presbyterian Church (pg. 9, map 35) provides a ride to get the ID once paperwork is completed.

Getting a Phone

You can order a government-sponsored phone online from a location such as the Hospitality Hub (above) or a public library (pg. 27.) You will need to submit proof of government assistance such as foodstamps or Medicaid. You will also need an address to mail the phone to (see Hosp. Hub.)

You can often obtain a government-sponsored phone at Shelby County TDHS (food stamp) office, located at 2003 Corporate Ave off Nonconnah Blvd. Check with the Hospitality Hub for other ideas on obtaining a phone.



If you are stopped by police for questioning:

DO stay calm and be polite.

 DO move slowly and delibaretely during the encounter.

DO keep your hands visible at all times.

 DO NOT resist arrest, even if you think the arrest is unfair. Resisting arrest is a punishable offense.

DO NOT run from or argue with the police, even if you are innocent.

DO NOT interfere with, obstruct, or resist, the police, even if you think they are violating your rights.

DO NOT make sudden movements or put your hands into a pocket or waist band.

DO NOT threaten to file a formal complaint.

DO NOT lie to or give false documents to police.

It is important to know and understand your rights! Regardless of your citizenship status, you are entitled to these rights:

- You have the right to remain silent. If you wish to exercise that right, make it clear by saying so out loud. In some states, you may have to give your name if asked to identify yourself, but you cannot be punished for refusing to answer any further questions.
- You have the right to refuse to consent for a search of yourself, your car, or your home. Police may "pat down" your clothing if they suspect a weapon. Do not resist being patted down. You have the right to refuse any search beyond this, unless an officer has a warrant.
- You have the right to know if you are under arrest. Ask the officer politely if you are free to leave.

Know Your Rights! / 5

If you are not under arrest, you have the right to calmly leave.

If you are under arrest:

- You have the right to know why. Clearly ask the officer.
- You have the **right to remain silent.** Anything you say can be used against you in a court of law.
- You have the **right to a lawyer**, and should ask for one immediately. You do not need give an explanation.
- You should not say anything, sign anything, or make any decisions without your lawyer. It is a good idea to memorize the phone number of your lawyer.
- If you cannot afford a lawyer, you have the right to a free lawyer known as a public defender.
- You have the **right to a local phone call**. Police cannot listen to the phone call if you are calling your lawyer.

Prepare yourself and your family in case you are arrested by memorizing the phone numbers of key family members and your lawyer.

If you feel your rights have been violated:

- Remember that police misconduct cannot be handled on the street.
- Do not resist arrest or threaten to file a complaint.
- Pay attention to details of the encounter, including the officer's name, agency, badge number, and car number.
- Write down everything you remember, and get the contact information of witnesses of the encounter.
- If you are injured, seek medical help and take pictures of any injuries.
- You can file a formal complaint over the phone or in writing with one of the agencies below:


